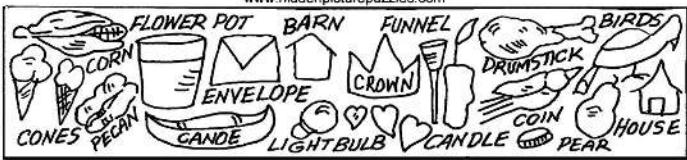

Cook's Corner - French Dip Sandwiches

I know how busy life can get now that we're between the holidays. Here's an easy slow cooker recipe that delivers a delicious hot sammie. And bonus points for serving up a post-Thanksgiving meal that isn't turkey! If you prefer to cook a smaller chuck roast, say a 1 & ½ pound piece, just cut the other ingredients in half, but keep the same cooking times. I like to serve this on toasted French bread or hard rolls, with a schmear of mayonnaise and topped with sliced provolone (or Swiss) cheese. Serve the au jus (cooking liquid and onions) in small bowls on the side for dipping. Add some roast potatoes and a salad and dig in! Bon appetit! *MP Christakos*

4 cups low sodium beef broth
2 envelopes French onion soup (dry) mix
3 to 4 yellow onions, sliced

4 TBSP Worcestershire Sauce
2 TBSP all purpose flour
3 lb chuck roast

In a 4 to 6 quart slow cooker, combine broth, dry soup mix, Worcestershire and flour and whisk until smooth. Add the beef chuck roast and onion. Cook on LOW for 7 to 8 hours or on HIGH for 4 to 5 hours. When done, slice the beef and then shred with two forks. If desired, bring the broth mixture to a boil until it's slightly thickened (you can add a little cornstarch to help thicken, if you like), but you don't want the au jus too thick.

Serve the meat on toasted French bread or hard rolls, with a schmear of mayonnaise (if desired) and topped with either Provolone or Swiss cheese. Serve the au jus in small bowls on the side for dipping.

Taxes Don't Come with Easy Answers

The budgetary storm that started with last year's cycle has arrived in many of our mailboxes in the form of increased tax bills due in December. Knowing that this was a periodic reassessment year, many have anticipated these increases, but that does not make the situation any easier, whether it's the municipal budget, the school budget, or our individual domestic budgets. Increases take away flexibility and limit options. Property values are on the rise, and that is good news for homeowners after years with a reputation as a "property-poor town." Even as tax rates correspondingly decline, most owners will see increases in their tax bill. Uncovering the budget deficit in the school's finances this year also adds to the burden and must be dealt with going forward. School administrators and our school board are working diligently to resolve the situation and have already reduced the impact from what was originally thought to be the amount of the deficit. That is also a bit of good news for taxpayers.

Other direct challenges to the budget planners have come in the form of contractual obligations that must be fulfilled, non-negotiable increases in health and other insurance programs that must be met, as well as increased demands on the welfare budget. Every citizen of Pittsfield can be confident that everyone—volunteer or professional who is working on these issues—is doing everything possible to mitigate the rising costs.

At the school and at the town hall, countless hours are spent in finding the best ways to provide the services the community demands without falling into the trap of becoming "penny wise and pound foolish." As I travel the town from the dump to the diner, I hear chatter about a need to "cut the budgets." Be assured that anyone associated with these local budgets has devoted themselves to preparing and executing the most cost-effective budgets possible. There are no magic wands. Any ill-conceived or simplistic reductions will only result in the elimination of programs and services on which we and our neighbors rely. Does anyone want to see a reduction in coverage by emergency services? What about the water supply, or wastewater treatment? Snow removal? Special Education services? I think not.

Yes, we are challenged. We have some large obstacles to overcome. But there are no shortcuts, no easy answers, no Facebook solutions, just hard work and continued vigilance by good people in the trenches every day. J. C. Allard, Pittsfield Select Board

CATAMOUNT WOMENAID UPDATE

When a single dad needs his car repaired so he can get to work, or a family suddenly needs a rent security deposit for an unexpected move, Catamount Womenaid steps in, quickly and quietly.

Catamount Womenaid is a women-led, all-volunteer nonprofit that provides fast, confidential, one-time financial assistance to individuals and families facing urgent needs in Barnstead, Deerfield, Epsom, Northwood, Pittsfield, and Strafford. Requests come from trusted community validators, such as school nurses, social workers, case managers, clergy, and medical providers, ensuring help reaches those who need it most, without red tape. Payments go directly to vendors such as landlords, utility companies, or auto shops, creating immediate and lasting impact.

Thanks to generous sponsors, grants, and new revenue from Casino Charitable Gaming, we've doubled our in-area assistance limit to \$2,000 and continue to offer up to \$500 for out-of-area requests in partnership with other Womenaid groups statewide. We also provided seed funding to help launch Womenaid of the Hamptons and meet regularly with other NH Womenaid organizations to share best practices.

From Jan. 1 through Oct. 15, CWA distributed \$56,000 in assistance across 28 New Hampshire communities, including our six local towns, and we are on track to reach \$75,000 by year's end. Needs continue to grow as public support programs shift. Assistance has helped families with emergency car repairs, housing deposits, medical bills, safe storage during transitions, and transportation for medical treatment.

Through our School Essentials Fund, we also support students in our six towns, \$500 per school, replenished as needed, for immediate needs like winter clothing, eyeglasses, snacks, hygiene products, and school supplies.

With no paid staff and minimal overhead, nearly every donated dollar goes directly to helping neighbors in crisis. Our board includes strong fiscal leadership, including two accountants and a former NH State Treasurer. 
