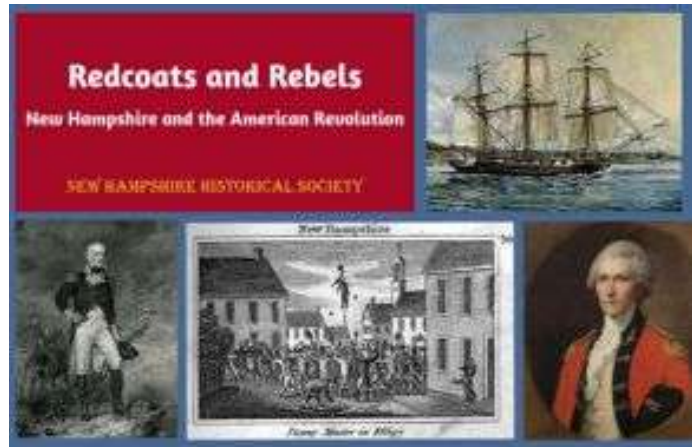

Updates from your School Board

Following the defeat of the Collective Bargaining Unit proposal for our Pittsfield teachers in March and the approval of the opportunity for the community to vote on a revised proposal, the School Board, Budget Committee and Selectmen have agreed on the following timeline to consider the revised proposal. June 4 – Budget Hearing; July 7 – Deliberative Session; August 4 – Official Ballot Voting. The warrant and related meetings will be properly posted for the public.



Safety and security updates for the schools are underway following a competitive bid process. The Board approved proposals submitted by Oak Security. Costs are fully covered by grant money received for this purpose.

The High School Options Study Committee held its first meeting on May 12. The next meetings are scheduled for May 26 and June 9 at 5:30. The Committee's work and recommendations will be submitted to the Board by December 31.

In accordance with state law, the Board approved an application for an Innovative School Waiver to allow greater flexibility in options and scheduling, without diminishing standards, for students who are not on track for graduation. A public hearing on the proposal will be held on June 4 at 6 pm at PMHS.

Senate Bill 101, calling for mandatory open enrollment statewide, has been sent to Interim Study, meaning that it will not pass this year. However, House Bill 751, which was amended to include open enrollment language in an otherwise unrelated bill, has been sent to a committee of conference to work out differences between House and Senate versions. The Pittsfield School Board strongly opposes open enrollment as proposed. Similar efforts in other states have demonstrated that open enrollment raises costs for local communities, disadvantages parents who cannot provide transportation to another district, and often leaves students receiving special education behind.

The end of the school year is quickly approaching, along with student testing, performances and demonstrations of learning.

The full minutes of meetings, along with agendas for upcoming meetings, are posted on the district's website at sau51.org. The Board meets on the first Thursday of each month at PMHS, beginning at 5:30. The public is always welcome.

The 29 April 2026 issue of the *Post* contains an article titled 'Dispatch from Concord.'

It came from Clayton Wood and Cy Aures, who are our state legislators from District 13.

I always read this one, 'specially now that the writers have responded to many requests from the *Post* for them to tell us not only what the NH House voted on, but also how they voted.

'The Dispatch' revealed that while SB 101 was defeated, our District 13 reps voted for it.

This bill is all about how Open Enrollment would be accomplished in New Hampshire.

Open Enrollment is an innovative way to deal with declining student numbers, the ability of students to maximize their education opportunities, and the difficulties we have with school funding.

I support the goals of Open Enrollment, but over the past few months I have learned that in its current form, it will not be a good thing for Pittsfield.

The details are complex, but major concerns over such things as student transportation, admission equality, and the costs of accommodating special needs students have convinced me that our School Board is correct when it opposes Open Enrollment.

I hope that in time the Open Enrollment concept can be modified to work well for our town.

But right now, I want to know why Clayton Wood and Cy Aures voted to enact an education plan that the town they represent has clearly opposed.

I will be eager to read what the next 'Dispatch from Concord' has to say in defense of their vote.

On Thursday, February 19, nine students in grades 10 and 11 were inducted into the National Honor Society (NHS) at a formal ceremony in the PMHS Lecture Hall. The chapter now has 18 active NHS members in grades 10 through 12. Members help stock and supervise the school's food pantry and tutor students at the elementary and middle school levels.



Fighting Through the Headwinds

The Selectboard did not meet this week, but there is still plenty of business to do and important things for me to report. In the 'great news' category: Selectman Art St. Laurent, in partnership with the Parks & Recreation Committee and the elementary school PTO, sponsored and hosted the recent Youth Fishing Derby at Clark's Pond—otherwise known as the town swimming pool. An amazing 110 youngsters participated, catching 75 of the 400 Rainbow and Brown trout the partners had released into the pond. With 325 fish still unaccounted for, it seems like there may be good fishing for the kids all summer.

At the meeting on May 12th, the Board considered and reappointed Adam Gauthier for another term with the Old Home Day Committee. We also considered and conditionally hired two full-time firefighters and two per-diem firefighters to bring that department back up to proper strength. In reorganizing the workflow at the town hall, the Board has uncovered some second- and third-order effects that we need to address. Notably, we need to rework the space for the Supervisors of the Checklist. We must reshuffle some appropriate space for the Supervisors and their files and equipment. Fortunately, that old building is quite flexible and we are confident that we can find the space needed without disrupting any of the other activities.

Sadly, this week I must report on the departure of our Superintendent of Public Works. Noel Gorley is a talented and resolute public servant who has given our community six years of truly outstanding service. He has led his department through starlight and storm with minimal resources, enduring catastrophic budget cuts along the way. Every resident of this community owes Noel a debt of gratitude and great good wishes for his new future.

Cooks Corner - Sausage Stuffed Zucchini

Welcome Summer – and all of its fresh bounty! We all know there will be plenty of gorgeous zucchini over the next few months. Here’s a recipe that takes advantage of these delectable and versatile vegetables. These stuffed zucchini are simple to pull together and if you put them in a plastic container, lined with parchment paper (top and bottom), they freeze well. At our house, we like to serve these with a nice, big salad; but

cooked pasta also makes a great side for this hearty dish. Be sure to put out the grated Parmesan when serving. Bon appetit!

6 medium-size zucchini

Kosher or coarse salt

3 TBSP olive oil

1 & ½ to 2 lbs sweet or spicy Italian sausage, casings removed

1 small onion, diced

¼ cup finely chopped sun-dried tomatoes (packed in oil)

3 large garlic cloves, minced

½ tsp basil

½ tsp black pepper

1/3 cup panko breadcrumbs

¾ cup fresh grated Parmesan cheese

Slice the zucchini in half length-wise and spoon out the flesh (reserving it for the stuffing) until the walls are about 1/3 inch thick. Roughly chop the flesh and set aside. Sprinkle the inside of the zucchini boats with a thin layer of salt, then lay them upside down on paper towels to drain while you prepare the filling. Do not skip this step. Salting the boats and letting them drain keeps them nice & firm while cooking.

Heat oven to 400. In a large skillet, heat the olive oil, add the sausage and cook until done and no longer pink, breaking it up into very small pieces. Add the zucchini flesh, onion, sun-dried tomato, garlic, basil and pepper. Cook, stirring often, until the vegetables are soft and have lost much of their liquid, about 6 to 8 minutes. Stir in the breadcrumbs. Taste the mixture, and salt as desired.


Wipe the salt from the drained boats and lay them in a lightly sprayed casserole dish. Spoon the filling, packing gently. Sprinkle each boat with the Parmesan cheese. Roast in the oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

SB498 establishes the New Hampshire children’s health association for the purpose of collecting assessments to fund care for children’s behavioral health services. There was much discussion on this with the agreement that this is needed but the bill only made it to interim study, 188-164. Most people felt that the law needed more authority enabling the insurance agencies to access the vital information to determine risk and service. Voted for.

SB409 increases the penalty for disobeying an officer to a felony in regard to an accident, speeding and wrong-way driving passed 190-164. Voted for.

SB667 establishes felony level offenses for the assault of emergency room personnel and sets a standard for “knowingly causing bodily injury” to any emergency room personnel. Failed at the first vote but after more debate, passed 179-173. Voted for.

SB439 requires a response by school employees within 10 days to respond honestly and completely to a written request by parents and legal guardians regarding information relating to their children. Passed 193-163. Voted for.

SB431 regulates school board policy that addresses parents’ and guardians’ complaints of any material claimed to be harmful or inappropriate to minors. Passed 188-161. Voted for.

SB574 establishes a commission to study the efficiency and structure of school administration units to determine opportunities for SAU consolidation and restructuring in order to decrease overhead cost. Passed 197-151. Voted for.

SB578 establishes a play-based and physical education curricula with recess as an activity that promotes fitness and counts recess as curriculum. After some discussion and a floor amendment, the bill passed on a voice vote.

SB223 prohibits the use of student identification cards from being used as a photo identification for voting which has already been signed into law but adds that only identifications listed in RSA 659:13, II(a) can be used to satisfy voter id. Passed 185-157. Voted for.

SB405 increases the limit on campaign contributions to \$200 for a 2-year election cycle before the donor must be identified and \$1000 for the need to file occupation and employer. Passed 176-159, Voted for.

SB488 expanded on the “right to try” of experimental medicines and authorizations for experimental medicine centers. Passed 197-145. Voted for.

SB552 permits classification of individuals based on biological sex under certain conditions for the use of bathrooms, showers, locker rooms and prison areas. Passed 179-159. Voted for.

CACR12 requires a super-majority vote of the general court to enact any broad-based taxes and ban an income tax in New Hampshire. The constitutional amendment received 192-148 votes but did not receive the 2/3 votes required. Voted for. Dem Rep. Thomas Opal proposed a progressive income tax starting at 3% which would continue to increase as the state spending rises. It failed.
