## Pittsfield Coding Cats

This has been an exciting year for the FLL Lego League Team, "The Pittsfield Coding Cats. We have competed in two competitions so far and we have another coming up on Saturday, May 30th at Merrimack Valley High School. We won the Innovation Design award at the True Robotics Event in April. The Innovation Design award is for the team that uses the design and configuration of their robot and extensions to improve their performance on the competition tasks. The team was very pleased to have Mrs. White with them for that event.



The theme for this year has been titled "Unearthed" and centers around archaeology. The team chose to study how archaeology affects our own community. Did you know that Native American artifacts have been found in Pittsfield? We learned from our own local Historical Society that there are three sites where evidence of the past exists. Artifacts were found when the original dam in the center of town was built. No one knows where those artifacts are today. The team would like to change the historical marker that is currently at the dam site to inform townspeople about the Native Americans that once lived in this area. Unfortunately, the state is not accepting applications for additional markers until it has a plan for repairing and caring for the current ones. We also learned that there was once a mineral spring on Catamount where a tribe from Epsom would come for the spring's healing properties, and a small tragic incident occurred around Horseshoe Pond.

The team would like to raise awareness about our town's history and the importance of using ground-penetrating radar before beginning large construction projects. It is important to use ground-penetrating radar, or GPR, before digging so that important pieces of our town history are not damaged and can be safely removed.

The team invites everyone to attend the final Spring "Jamboree" event at Merrimack Valley High School on May 30th from 8:00 to 4:00. There will be exciting robotic matches to watch and opportunities to learn more about student innovation and teamwork.

## **A Full Agenda but, Thankfully, More Routine**

Your selectboard met to consider a full agenda last Tuesday, but with the realities of the default budget finding their place, the board can focus on some of the other business needed by the community. Of utmost importance were some decisions regarding personnel appointments that keep our town government functioning. The board interviewed and hired Aiden Steinmann as our newest full-time firefighter/EMT against the two vacancies in that department. Welcome aboard Aiden. Fortunately, a second individual is working through the system, and we look forward to getting back up to strength this month.

The board reviewed and accepted two important volunteer applications: Bob Giegerich as a new appointee to the Parks & Recreation Commission, and a reappointment of Bryan Mika to the Conservation Commission. A hearty welcome is due to both these individuals for stepping up to help take the community forward. Theirs and every volunteer's services are invaluable.

Speaking of volunteers: Fallon Reed has agreed to accept the duties of Deputy Welfare Officer in addition to her role as Selectboard Administrator. She will assist the Welfare Director with some much-needed backup and provide a second set of eyes in this vital "no fail" area of our collective responsibility. As we go forward, Fallon and Cara Marston will continue to work with the whole board to refine the job descriptions for their newly redefined positions of Board Administrator and Finance Manager.

Police Chief Collins discussed with the board the recent 287-G Memorandum of Understanding with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (I.C.E.) under the Immigration and Nationality Act. Pittsfield joined 26 other New Hampshire towns with delegated authority to detain and transport offenders determined to be in the United States illegally. Federal funding through the agreement stands to ease Pittsfield's tax burden in relation to our police budget going forward.

Perceiving the board's workload to be excessive, one member proposed a weekly meeting instead of bi-weekly. After a discussion and debate that considered all the other boards, commissions, and committees that each selectboard member is required to attend, the board voted to keep the 2nd and 4th Tuesday schedule as it now stands. Entering the upcoming budget season will necessitate meeting weekly through that process anyway.

Before turning to committee reports, department reports, and items of information, the meeting wrapped up with consideration and approval of a property tax abatement and five warrants for timber, gravel, and land use change taxes.

## Memorial Day - 2026

Memorial Day, a time to mourn and honor the men and the women of the U.S. military who died while serving in the armed forces.

The custom of decorating the graves of Civil War soldiers and sailors was originally established as "Decoration Day." Later it became an occasion for honoring all those who died in any of America's conflicts, and it became a national holiday called "Memorial Day" in 1971.

On Sunday, May 24, thanks to the Board of Selectmen who organized the ceremony, the people of Pittsfield honored the fallen with a dignified service at Dustin Park, the site of the Pittsfield War Memorial.

Selectboard member Paul Colby welcomed and introduced the participants. Assisting Paul with the ceremony were Pastor Dennis Russell of the First Congregational Church, Pittsfield; retired Army Colonel J.C. Allard; Manchester's American Legion Post 22 Color Guard; Pipe Major Tom Martineau and Chieftain Ruthie Smith, bagpipers; NH Air National Guard Master Sgt. Jared Griffin, who sang the national anthem; NH Army National Guard Specialist Stephen St. Laurent, bugler. A contingent of Pittsfield's police and fire fighters was also in attendance.

The guest speaker was Brigadier General Allen D. Aldenberg, Assistant Adjutant General of New Hampshire. He honored all those who had served and specifically addressed the young people in attendance, encouraging them to remember the significance of Memorial Day.

Representing the Gold Star families, Mrs. Phyllis Brooks Conway, with the assistance of Brigadier General Aldenberg and Colonel Allard, placed a wreath at the memorial.

Our thanks to the Pittsfield Selectboard for keeping the tradition of Memorial Day in our community.

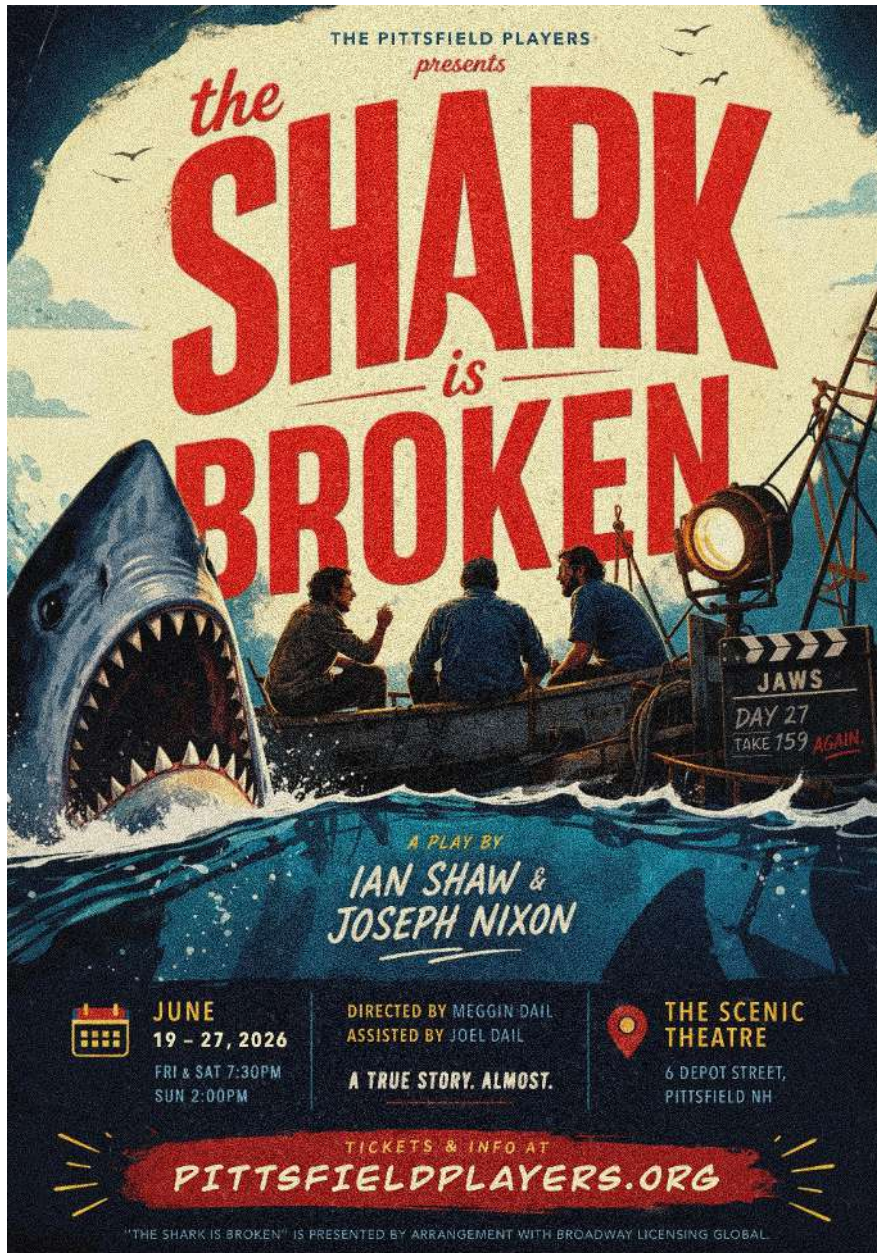

## Supervisor of the Checklist Verification

New Hampshire law requires that the Supervisors of the Checklist verify the checklist every year. Any person on the checklist who has not voted in the past five years must re-register to remain on the checklist, unless the voter registered after the last state general election. The supervisors are sending notice letters to these voters at the address the voter provided when registering.

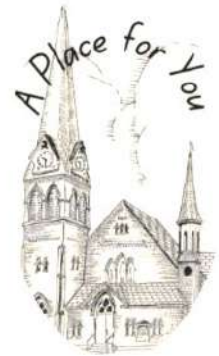

## Cooks Corner - Hot Chicken Dip and Sweet Pepper Poppers

Now that the happy days of summer are here, I'm sure you have lots of plans for get-togethers with friends and family, cookouts and fun camping trips. Here we offer up two fun and easy appetizer ideas. For those of you who may be watching your summertime waistline – both of these recipes are very low carb. Enjoy! *MP Christakos*

### Hot Chicken Dip - low carb!

| 6 cups cooked, shredded chicken  | 1 tsp garlic salt  |
| 12 oz shredded Cheddar cheese, divided (grated from a block of cheese) | ½ tsp black pepper   |
| 8 oz cream cheese, softened  | Sliced scallions, for garnish                                  |
| 1 cup sour cream   | Chopped fresh cilantro, for garnish                            |
| 1 cup mayonnaise   | Tortilla chips, crackers, breadsticks, cut veggies for serving |
| 7 to 8 oz canned diced green chiles, drained                           |  |

Heat oven to 350. Lightly coat a 13x9 inch baking dish with cooking spray.

In a large bowl, stir together chicken, 8 oz of the Cheddar, the cream cheese, sour cream, mayonnaise, green chiles, garlic salt and pepper until well combined. Transfer the mixture to the prepared baking dish. Top with the remaining 4 oz of Cheddar.

Bake for 30 to 35 minutes or until heated through and cheese is melted. Garnish with scallions and cilantro.

### Sweet Pepper Poppers – low carb!

| 6 cups cooked, shredded chicken  | 1 cup mayonnaise                             |
| 12 oz shredded Cheddar cheese, divided (grated from a block of cheese) | 7 to 8 oz canned diced green chiles, drained |
| 8 oz cream cheese, softened  | 1 tsp garlic salt                            |
| 1 cup sour cream   | ½ tsp black pepper                           |
|  | Sliced scallions, for garnish                |

Heat oven to 400. Cut the peppers in half lengthwise, remove the seeds. Place peppers, cut side up, on a foil lined baking sheet.

Stir together pimiento cheese, bacon and black pepper. Divide the cheese mixture among the peppers.

Bake for 5 minutes or until cheese melts. Remove from oven, drizzle with the warmed red pepper jelly and garnish with additional chopped bacon.

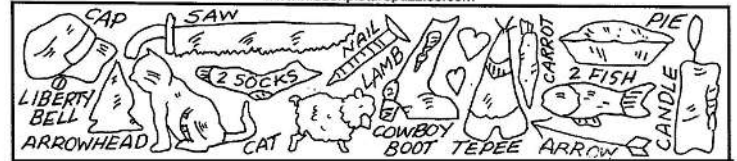

The following bills were amended by the Senate which the House voted to concur (agree) with:

HB1236 authorizes county correction officers to use body-worn cameras while performing their duties. Passed 191-154. Voted for.

HB1610 requires the school districts to use year-end unassigned general funds to ONLY help reduce taxes or fill designated special reserve funds for real emergencies and special contingency funds. Passed 186-163. Voted for.

HB1336 creates a mechanism for "regulated conditional deposits" allowing landlords under certain conditions to collect an additional deposit from applicants who do not meet certain screening conditions. It was thought that this could help some people obtain a place to live. It Passed. Voted for.

As finally amended, HB1358 establishes a commission to study: 1. The feasibility of transitioning New Hampshire's public schools to public charter schools. 2. Potential impacts on education funding, local property taxes, governance, and educational outcomes. Passed 184-164. Voted for.

HB1681 creates a legal framework for "innovative housing structures" including tiny homes, tiny homes on wheels and Yurts. Passed 242-102. Voted for.

HB232 establishes protections for medical professionals who conscientiously object to participating in certain medical procedures, including abortion, based on religious, moral, or ethical convictions. Passed 179-155. Voted for.

HB1419 would establish a committee to study whether New Hampshire should create a specialized court with jurisdiction over corporate, commercial, and equitable matters (often referred to as a business court) similar to the system in Delaware that incorporates many large businesses. Passed on a voice vote.

HB1442 permits classification of individuals based on biological sex in certain limited circumstances, requires bathrooms and locker rooms in public schools and municipally owned buildings to be designated and used based on sex and allows places of public accommodation to establish sex-specific restroom and locker room policies under specified conditions. Passed 184-155. Voted for.

HB1542 establishes a committee to study New Hampshire's electric renewable portfolio standard and the Renewable Energy Fund. Passed 180-148. Voted for.
