The Laramie Project is a play written by The Techtonic Theatre Project of NYC after the troupe visited Laramie, WY, following the nation's first recognized hate crime in 1998: the murder of Matthew Shepard. The show consists of "moments" instead of scenes that are made up of snippets from the troupe's interviews done between the troupe's members and Laramie's residents. The moments consist of the telling of both sides of the story, finishing with a message of hope for the future.

New Hampshire Tea Crafters

If you haven't been there yet, do yourself a favor and visit the new tea shop on Leavitt Road (by the car wash). Julie Worthen and her sister opened New Hampshire Tea Crafters about a month ago and they're already developing a regular clientele.

Julie shared that she has long been interested in herbs, herbal remedies and teas. She hand blends all the teas they sell and offers over 35 different recipes including black, green, white and a wide variety of herbal teas. Julie and her sister will also create custom blends upon request. One of their most popular teas is made from dried beets, hibiscus and other herbs. They call it "Beet the Clock" – it is delightfully refreshing! They also make smoothies, and another popular favorite is the "Pink Panther" (in honor of PMHS). It's a frosty made with a mix of berries and coconut milk.

In addition to tea, the shop makes homemade soups and panini sandwiches for lunch. They



make their own flavored sugars and sell a nice selection of locally made hand-crafts. Julie says they hope to obtain a soft-serve machine soon and will plan to make tea-flavored ice cream. Just in time for summer!





Panther Updates: Pittsfield Elementary School

Behavior Report At Pittsfield Elementary School staff remain deeply committed to cultivating a positive school culture focused on the core values of respect, responsibility, safety, and kindness. The Student Success Center (SSC) plays a central role in this effort. Staff consistently deliver the Zones of Regulation curriculum, guide morning meeting activities, and provide responsive interventions when behavioral expectations are not met. Eight staff members have completed training in the Multi-Tiered System of Supports for Behavior. With the proper support team in place, this tiered framework ensures that all students receive the appropriate level of support to succeed.

Behavioral Data Overview

Student Success Center Referrals

- August to December 2024–25: 184 referrals
- August to December 2023–24: 345 referrals
- January to March 2024–25: 109 referrals
- January to March 2023–24: 234 referrals

Major Referrals Entered by Administration (Alma)

- August to December 2024–25: 299 incidents
- August to December 2023–24: 157 incidents
- January to March 2024–25: 260 incidents
- January to March 2023–24: 105 incidents

These data points reveal key trends. While SSC referrals have decreased significantly compared to last year, administrative major referrals have increased. This shift may reflect the ongoing behavioral challenges some students face, particularly in the areas of defiance, physical aggression, disrespect, and inappropriate language.

We are actively addressing these patterns through planning and daily communication with families. Staff are supporting students in becoming more reflective and responsible, with many beginning to take ownership of their actions. With strong collaboration between staff, families, and the wider community, we continue working toward a safe, respectful learning environment where every student can thrive.

Kindergarten Registration Kindergarten registration officially opened in March, and families of incoming students were invited to complete enrollment paperwork and schedule a one-on-one appointment with the kindergarten team. On April 9 those individualized sessions took place. Families were able to ask questions, learn about the daily schedule, explore the curriculum, discuss what to expect during their child's transition into kindergarten, and share important information about their child's personality, interests, and needs—ensuring that the school team is well-prepared to support each learner from day one.

Our kindergarten program is intentionally designed as a play-based model aligned with the NH Department of Education's kindergarten standards. We believe that young children learn best through developmentally appropriate, hands-on experiences that foster creativity, curiosity, and problem-solving.

Preschool Play-Based Classroom Visits In May our preschool classrooms will open their doors for play-based visits with incoming 3- and 4-year-old children and their families. These sessions are designed to create a warm, welcoming first experience for our youngest learners. While students engage with thoughtfully selected materials in a play-rich environment, families will have the opportunity to observe the classroom in action, meet our dedicated preschool staff, and gain a better understanding of our curriculum and daily routines.

This year, our preschool teacher, Mrs. Perry, has been working closely with members of our instructional leadership team to strengthen curriculum alignment and early learning outcomes. This collaboration supports foundational math understanding and introduction to key literacy concepts and vocabulary-rich instruction, setting the stage for future academic success. Spring Family/Teacher Conferences Our Spring Family/Teacher Conferences were held the week of April 14. Our fifth graders once again took the lead for their student-led conferences: a model that encourages reflection, ownership, and goal setting as they approach the transition to middle school. These conferences provide a valuable platform for students to share their progress and set academic and personal goals in collaboration with both their teachers and families. At PES we deeply believe in the power of partnership.

Whether it's welcoming our youngest learners or empowering students to lead their own conferences, our commitment to family engagement remains at the heart of all we do.

PES Week of Kindness We celebrated a Week of Kindness from April 21 to 25. This special week was led by our school counselor, Mr. Curtin, who truly embodies kindness in everything he does. Most recently, he worked with our fifth graders to build Buddy Benches for the playground, designated spaces where students can sit if they're feeling lonely or in need of a friend.

Throughout the week, students and staff participated in a variety of themed activities that promote kindness and connection. On Mix It Up Monday, students sat with someone new during lunch or class and discovered what they have in common, then contributed to a school-wide bulletin board that celebrates those connections. Earth Day Tuesday focused on caring for our school environment, with each class adopting a space to clean or beautify. On Thank You Wednesday, students helped serve a special appreciation lunch to honor our local police and fire departments, SAU staff, school board members, and dedicated community volunteers. Walk-a-thon Thursday brought us together for a joyful school-wide walk, set to music by our own Ms. Ingerson. We wrapped-up the week with Friendship Friday, when older students will visit younger classrooms to read stories about kindness and friendship.

PES Art in the Community Beginning on April 1, 2025, thirty pieces of artwork created by our talented PES student artists were proudly displayed at the Friendly Diner. This collaboration between PES and the Friendly

Diner offered a unique opportunity to showcase student creativity in a community-centered space. Families are encouraged to stop by, enjoy a meal, and celebrate the artistic talents of our students.

A heartfelt thank you goes to Ms. Steven for her hard work, creativity, and coordination in making this wonderful opportunity a reality. We are also grateful to the Friendly Diner for supporting the arts and helping us highlight the incredible work happening at PES.



Emergency Management Update Keeping our students and staff safe—both physically and emotionally—will always be a top priority. We've been taking important steps to strengthen our emergency response plans and make sure we're prepared if the unexpected happens.

One of those steps has been to identify a designated Area of Refuge here at school. This would be used if we needed to evacuate the building but couldn't stay outside due to unsafe weather or other conditions. With support from Mr. Hamilton and Dusty Durant, we've confirmed that the PMHS gymnasium would be our relocation site. We've put clear systems in place for moving students, taking attendance, and making sure everyone is safe and supported while we wait for the next steps.

We also met with members of Joy Church to finalize our off-site evacuation plan. After touring the building, we agreed it would be a great fit if we ever needed to leave campus entirely. It's close by, easy to get to, and has the space we'd need to keep our school community comfortable and cared for. Our PES Leadership Team toured the space and we've already begun mapping out how we'd organize students and staff if we needed to use it.

In addition, we're working on a reciprocal plan for PMHS to use PES as their Area of Refuge if they were to experience an emergency. Mr. Hamilton and Dusty are helping to lead that planning as well, making sure our schools are aligned and ready to support each other. I'm so grateful for the collaboration and support from our staff and community partners. Taking these steps helps us feel more confident and prepared, knowing we're doing everything we can to take care of our kids and one another. Kristen White, PES Principal

Panther Updates: Student Support Services

Students with Disabilities

Pittsfield has 143 students with disabilities who qualify for an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Of these students, 33 qualify for more than one disability. Additionally, five students have been newly referred for an evaluation or are currently being evaluated. These numbers highlight the diverse needs of students requiring special education services, underscoring the importance of providing individualized support to ensure their academic success.

Section 504

PES has 26 students who are eligible for a 504 plan, while PMHS has 34 students with a 504 plan. These students receive accommodations to support their academic success and ensure they have equal access to education. The 504 plans are designed to provide tailored support for students with disabilities or chronic conditions, promoting their inclusion and helping them to thrive in the classroom environment.

Out of District and Charter Schools

Currently, Pittsfield has 16 students (part of the 143) enrolled in private schools or public charter schools for whom the district is legally responsible for meeting their special education needs. These students receive services and accommodations as mandated by law to ensure they have access to an appropriate education regardless of their school setting. The district works closely with the private and charter schools to ensure that these students' Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) are properly implemented and that they receive the necessary support. These partnerships help provide specialized support for students who require services beyond what is available within the district.





Cooks Corner Stir-Fry Pork & Vegetables with Wonton Crisps

With warmer weather on the way, my thoughts often turn to looking for lighter fare for lunch or dinner. This recipe fits the bill. It's a great little stir fry, but doesn't involve all the chopping that most stir-fry recipes require. We enjoy this, as is, in a bowl, but it's also great served over cooked rice. Feel free to amp up the fish sauce if you like things a little hotter. Bon appetit!

½ cup soy sauce

2 TBSP unseasoned rice vinegar

1 TBSP sugar

1 TBSP sesame oil

1 TBSP fish sauce or sambal oelek (chili paste), Sriracha or hot sauce

1&1/2 lb ground pork (or ground chicken)

6 scallions, white & green parts separated, thinly sliced

4 cloves garlic, minced

4 tsp grated ginger (or from a tube of prepared ginger paste)

1 (12 to 14 oz) bag green cole slaw mix

8 oz shitake mushrooms, stemmed and sliced

2 cups wonton crisps (in produce where they sell croutons)

Combine soy, vinegar, sugar, sesame oil and the fish sauce (or whatever you're using) in a bowl. Cook the pork (or chicken) in a skillet until no longer pink, 5 to 7 minutes. Add scallion whites, garlic and ginger; cook until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add cole slaw mix, mushrooms, and soy sauce mixture and cook until cabbage is just wilted, about 3 minutes.

Off heat, stir in scallion greens

To serve, divide pork mixture into serving bowls and top each bowl with a generous helping of wonton crisps.

Panther Updates: Pittsfield Middle High School

We have established Saturday, June 14 for the Class of 2025 Commencement Ceremony. The Senior Awards Ceremony will be held on Friday, June 13 at 7:00 p.m. Please save the date for our annual Exhibition on Thursday, May 22. Middle school students will continue to attend school at the standard time on May 22, but high school students will have a non-traditional school day from 12:00-7:00 p.m. Our theme for this year's Exhibition is *Learning is Lifelong*. This year's Exhibition will feature an art gallery in the main lobby, the film premier of *Confessions of a Tardy Student*, and a performance from our PMHS band and chorus.

Eighth Grade Promotion Update: The third quarter ended on March 21. The administration mailed letters to all families of eighth-grade students not passing two or more core courses. According to the Middle School Promotion policy, "in order for a student to be promoted from eighth to ninth grade, first-year eighth grade students are required to pass all course competencies in their core courses (English, math, science, and social studies)." In the 2029 cohort, 13 students (36%) out of 36 are of concern. This percentage of students who need to bring up their competency scores is not uncommon for early spring. Currently there are high attendance rates among eighth grade students attending the Middle School After School Program for extra help. In addition, regular conversations and meetings take place with families, administration, advisors and students, and we are confident that most students will meet the promotion requirements.

We are thrilled to offer middle school students who met the academic criteria the opportunity to be inducted into the National Junior Honor Society. Twenty students in grades six through eight applied, and the faculty council has reviewed the applications. The induction ceremony will take place after the April break.

House Session April 10, 2025

April 10th was a special day for the House, called "Crossover." It was the last day to complete house bills before moving the passed ones on to the Senate (and vice versa). The rest of the day was voting on the State's biennial (2yr) budget.

After a failed amendment to remove maintenance for the state-owned railroads, **HB15** was approved on a voice vote to acquire over \$130 million in loans for statewide capital improvements.

HB302 passed, 192-179, and approved the state treasury to invest and diversify in precious metals and digital assets.

HB493, requiring education for healthcare providers on child abuse and neglect, as a condition of licensing, failed as healthcare workers are already aware of what to look for. Vote was 177-193.

HB71, prohibiting the use of public buildings like schools to be used as shelters for illegal aliens, passed 209-162.

HB66, relative to the Right to Know. Discussion was long whether to change the word "citizen" to "person" to determine who has the right to know. Believe it or not, the argument was that "citizen" is an undefined term in current law! **HB66** allows anyone to make the request, regardless of where you live. People can abuse this right for the wrong reasons, resulting in a significant cost burden to the town. It passed 207-164.

HB115, passed by a vote of 188-18, increases the income eligibility for the Education Freedom Account (EFA) program to 400% in 2026 and then completely removes the criteria in 2007, making the program universal. Many other states have caught on to the multiplied value in school choice.

HB282 passed overwhelmingly (296-76), and increases the maximum benefits for first responders critically injured in the line of duty to \$1M biennially.

After an attempt to table, **HB511** passed 211-161 and outlines the improved cooperation between local law enforcement and the federal agencies regarding the enforcement of federal immigration law.

HB1 reduced the Governor's budget to account for the difference in revenue estimate between the Governor and the Ways & Means Committee of \$800 million. The Governor planned on dipping into the Rainy Day fund, but the finance committee wanted to preserve the AA+ rating that we have just procured over the last year. These cuts came from increasing just about all income fees, eliminating over 200 state positions, reducing funding to many state programs, increasing revenue from gaming, and consolidating some judicial agencies. **HB1** passed 192-183.

The next 4 hours were about **HB2**, which also needs to pass for the budget to be considered approved by the House. It was mostly about considering over 25 amendments to either bring back some of the funding or give wanted laws a special interest position. As expected, these were mainly partisan votes, with some of the cuts getting returned to the budget. Finally, **HB2** was approved 185-175 at 7:10.
