Notes from the Selectboard

Your Selectboard met in regular session on Tuesday night, September 22, to attend to a variety of new and old business. The first was a presentation by Selectman Dan Greene concerning his proposal to construct a casino, hotel, and restaurant complex on his property on Will Smith Road. This was an information-only presentation given the application for the project has not been reviewed by the Zoning Board of Adjustment, or the Planning Board.

There were ten items on the Consent Calendar that the Board voted to approve, including a reaffirmation of the sludge removal project at the wastewater treatment facility. Also, there were two donations from the Clothes Closet to the Parks and Recreation Committee for fall activities. Both were unanimously accepted.

Under 'new business' the Board accepted personal donations made to the Old Home Day Committee. The Board discussed a citizen's request for traffic warning signs on Route 107 and Main Street but were unable to direct the signs to be placed as that roadway belongs to the state and not the town. The Town Clerk briefed the Board on the deeding of three properties for non-payment of taxes. The affected owners may yet repurchase the properties before the town proceeds to auction to recoup the taxes owed.

Next came a discussion of repairs to the pinion gear on the highway department's grader, a task that needs doing before snow season, and certainly well ahead of next spring's projected grading of our dirt roads. The public meeting finished with a briefing, discussion and acceptance of the PES-PTO's plans to relocate the annual Trunk-or-Treat Halloween festivities to the area of Broadway. Though Broadway will be closed for part of the evening, residents will still be able to access Cram Avenue from Carroll Street.

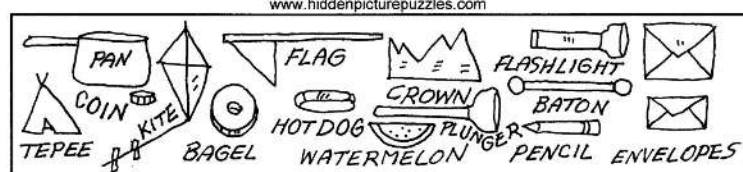

Why I Oppose HB 1300, and Why You Should, Too

Clayton Wood and Cyril Aures have been encouraging voters to approve the warrant based on HB 1300, which by law must now be on the ballot on November 3. Essentially, this poorly structured, state-mandated warrant combines two questions for voters into a single warrant article, but voters cannot vote separately on each question – they must vote the whole thing up or down.

Here's what the actual language of the warrant article must say on the ballot:

"Shall the [name of municipality] limit property tax growth for [name(s) of school district(s)] under RSA 32:5-i? If adopted for a two-year period: (1) the local property tax levy may not grow beyond the prior year's amount, adjusted for inflation and new construction; (2) SAU central office spending may not exceed 6 percent of total school district appropriations; and (3) bonded capital costs are excluded from both limits. These caps apply only to administrative operations of the SAU central office and do not affect classroom instruction, school-based services, or other municipal expenditures. These limits may be overridden as provided in RSA 32:5-i. Adoption requires a three-fifths (3/5) majority vote."

Huh? It is patently false that caps apply only to administrative operations of the SAU. To promise that classroom instruction and school-based services will not be affected by part 1 of the warrant is both disingenuous and beyond the scope of what the state can determine.

HB 1300 was initially introduced as a bill to re-assign some NH towns between Congressional District 1 and 2. Hijacked by the Election Law Committee of the House, (on which both Clayton Wood and Cyril Aures serve), the bill was entirely rewritten to serve the purpose of foisting this poorly written, confusing, and binding state-level warrant on voters, totally divorced from the usual local discussions about school budgets, public hearings with the local budget committee, and informed choice. Pittsfield and Chichester already have local control, voting school district budgets up or down, and allowing tax caps and other measures to be introduced and voted on at the local level.

Instead of trying to solve the very real problems of public education and the unfair and inequitable over-reliance on the local property tax to fund it, Clayton and Cyril are champions of a travesty of a law that seeks to confuse voters and undermine true choice. If anyone doubts that they are committed to dismantling public education, they only need to look at their support for HB 1815 which sought to have the state take credit for all school property taxes raised locally, to say that the Supreme Court has no jurisdiction in deciding the constitutionality of the state's approach, followed by Cyril's gleeful statement that he expects the Claremont decision (which included Pittsfield as a plaintiff) to be overturned soon. In other words, they don't like what the Supreme Court has said three times now – that the way NH funds public education is unconstitutional – and they want the state absolved of any responsibility for fair access to public education at an equitable tax rate.

Cooks Corner: *Grandma's Maple-Frosted Apple Tart*

Apple season is officially upon us, and we have a local culinary triumph to celebrate! A huge congratulations goes out to our neighbor, Corine Miller, whose incredible apple tart took home First Place at Pittsfield's Annual Cook-Off during Old Home Day on September 12th. Corine generously shared her award-winning recipe with the community, and it is an absolute must-try this autumn.

Pie:

- 15 ounces Pillsbury pie crust
- 1 teaspoon flour
- 1 ½ cup cornflakes (non-sweetened)
- 6 cups peeled, thinly sliced apples
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 egg white beaten

Glaze:

- ½ cup powdered sugar
- 3 Tablespoons maple-flavored syrup

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Allow both crusts to sit at room temperature for 15-20 minutes.

Unfold one crust and sprinkle with 1 teaspoon flour.

Turn crust flour-side down on ungreased cookie sheet or pizza pan. Sprinkle cornflakes over crust to ½ inch from the edge. Place cut apples in a mound over the cornflakes. Pour the sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg mixture evenly over the apples. Brush edge of crust with egg white.

Unfold second crust and place over the apple filling. Fold edge of bottom crust up over the top crust and pinch edges to seal. Cut slits in top crust so steam can escape. Brush egg white over top crust. Bake 350 degrees for 45-55 minutes or until golden brown and apples are tender.

While still warm, but not hot, drizzle glaze over top crust.

The first meeting of the NH Commission to study Efficiency and Structure of School Administrative Units (SAU's) is scheduled for October 2. I will be reporting on the findings of that commission in the "Dispatch." In order to understand the process, I thought it would be beneficial to summarize the findings of a previous committee to study SAU consolidation that concluded on November 1, 2025 (SB 57, Chapter 220:1).

The law required the committee to examine six areas: Clarify responsibilities of SAUs and local school districts. Examine superintendent roles and service delivery. Evaluate financial feasibility and economies of scale due to consolidation. Examine one SAU per county, with separate SAUs for Manchester and Nashua. Examine staffing and oversight of SAUs and districts. Examine SAU mergers under RSA 194-C:2.

The Majority Report recommended a County-Level Administration approach that created 10 elected county school administrators, one for each county while maintaining separate elected administrators for Manchester and Nashua. This approach would return academic responsibilities, such as curriculum and teacher hiring, to local school districts while moving accounting, HR, insurance, compliance, transportation, and purchasing to the higher administrative level. The change would begin in 2028, with the transition targeted for the 2029–30 school year.

The Minority Report concluded that more research was needed. They felt there was insufficient evidence that consolidation would reduce overall taxpayer costs and potential increases in transportation and local administrative expenses. There were also concerns about additional responsibilities being placed on school principals with the move of the local SAU. There was a need to examine voluntary consolidation and shared services as well as understanding the needs of smaller SAUs separately rather than applying a uniform countywide model.

The majority report cited 2023 Census data indicating that New Hampshire's administrative spending was approximately \$2,029 per student, described as the second highest among the 50 states. It also referenced a 1993 New Hampshire study that projected savings from eliminating SAUs and replacing them with Department of Education services and district business administrators. However, the minority emphasized that the committee had not yet developed concrete cost projections demonstrating that the proposed consolidation would produce net savings for taxpayers.

The report presented two different approaches: a centralized administration that functions through elected county-level leadership while preserving local academic responsibilities, or further researching consolidation models, with greater attention to local control, actual financial savings, and its effects on schools and communities.

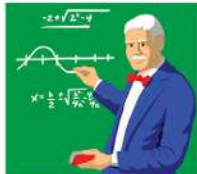
