PUBLIC HEARING MEETING NOTICE

E-911 ROAD NAMING & RENUMBERING CHANGE

The Board of Selectmen, pursuant to NH RSA 231:133 and 231:133-a, is implementing a second batch of recommendations from the NH Division of Emergency Services and Communications (NH E-911) to rename/renumber certain addresses in the categories listed below which pose a safety concern. These changes will enable our public safety personnel (including mutual aid personnel responding from neighboring towns) to respond to critical situations in a more expedient time frame.

Access readdress – properties should be addressed from the street that provides access. In this batch #2, there are three properties that will be considered: 28 Mountain Road, 52 Watson Street, and 322 Catamount Road.

Private lanes – shared driveway access to three or more addressable structures or driveways that are significant in length should have their own private lane designation. In this batch #2, there are four driveways to be considered for designating as private lanes:

- the roadway to the Graylag Nature Preserve cabins off of Clough Road
- the driveways to 334 & 350 Clough Road; 212, 222, & 230 Catamount Road; and to three parcels currently addressed from 1 Kaime Road

Mobile home park addressing - there are three mobile home parks with nonstandard addressing:

- #62 & #65 Leavitt Road parks should have their own private lane designations
- #175 Leavitt Road mobile homes should have their own street numbers (175/177/179/181 etc.) instead of unit numbers sharing the same master street number 175, as they are all separate addressable structures directly accessible from Leavitt Road

Out of sequence addressing – with the renumbering of the mobile homes at 175 Leavitt Road, the current 178 Leavitt Road (across the street) will be renumbered for consecutive numbering flow.

Affected property owners have been notified of this public hearing. All interested parties are invited, but are not required, to attend the public hearing. Official notification of the address changes being implemented after the public hearing will be mailed to the affected property owners.

The public hearing will be held at 6:15 p.m. on Tuesday, June 3, 2025, at the Town Office, 85 Main Street, Pittsfield, NH 03263.

Cooks Corner - Trio of Chicken Salads

Summer is right around the corner and it's time for salads! Here's a trio of chicken salad recipes that will bring smiles to your next picnic or cookout. These also make great sandwiches. Bon appetit! *MP Christakos*

Creamy Pesto Chicken Salad with Greens

3 cups chopped cooked chicken breast (rotisserie works well here)

14 cup prepared pesto

14 cup mayonnaise

3 TBSP finely minced red onion

Salt & pepper

6 to 8 cups salad greens

2 TBSP olive oil

2 TBSP red wine vinegar

1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved

Combine pesto, mayonnaise and onion in a bowl. Add the chicken and toss well to coat. Whisk olive oil, vinegar, salt and pepper in a large bowl. Add the salad greens and toss well to coat. Serve the chicken salad and sliced tomatoes on top of the greens.

Buffalo Chicken Salad

3 stalks celery, thinly sliced

1 head Boston Bibb lettuce

14 cup hot sauce, such as Frank's

14 cup ranch dressing

2 tsp white wine vinegar

3 cups shredded cooked chicken

1 cup shredded (matchstick size) carrots

¼ cup crumbled blue cheese

Arrange lettuce leaves on serving plates. In a large bowl, whisk hot sauce, ranch dressing and vinegar. Add the chicken, carrots and celery and toss to coat. Season with salt & pepper to taste. Top the lettuce with the chicken salad and sprinkle with blue cheese crumbles.

Chopped Chinese Chicken Salad

½ cup sesame ginger bottled salad dressing


1 (14 oz) package coleslaw mix


14 cup sliced cashews or peanuts, lightly salted

2 cups shredded cooked chicken (rotisserie is perfect)

1 cup thinly sliced red bell pepper

Dress the slaw with the sesame ginger dressing. Toast the nuts in a skillet for 5 minutes and then add to the slaw. Add the shredded chicken and the red bell pepper to the slaw and toss everything to combine. A fun idea – serve this chicken salad wrapped in a warmed flour tortilla and extra dressing on the side for dipping.

House Session May 1, 2025

Still in "Crossover," we work on passed Senate bills while the Senate works on ours.

Executive Department and Administration: **SB74** requires all state departments granting permits to provide annual reports to the state legislature. This information will be useful to determine which are effective and which should be changed. It passed on a voice vote.

Judiciary: SB146, which removes the requirement for a medical examiner to view a deceased person before issuing a death record, passed on a voice vote.

Labor, Industrial, and Rehabilitative Services: All three committee bills were tabled! **SB67** would require workers' compensation and resolution of payments lasting more than 90 days to be resolved by the commissioner. **SB169** would have required employers to provide cost sharing and a breakdown of payments and other metrics to employees receiving workers' compensation benefits. **SB171** would require an employer to pay at least 2 hours of wages if the employee reports to work at the employer's request.

Science, Tech, Energy: **SB228** modifying the scope of the community solar projects, placing limits on the solar arrays' size, and implementing metering costs to a broader group of participants, failed to pass by a vote of 151-190.

Ways & Means: All passed on voice vote. **SB60** was amended to include limitations on the health and human services' rule-making authority regarding immunization requirements. This bill allows for advanced wagering on horse racing and was passed with an amendment. **SB63** modifies the calculation of Meals and Rooms Tax Revenue used to determine the budget for the Division of Travel and Tourism. **SB73** increases the maximum payout from \$4000 to \$5000 in bingo games. **SB107** enables the state treasurer to invest certain fish and game funds for the development of a nongame species management program. And **SB160** raises the maximum ticket value for raffle tickets held in conjunction with bingo games.

Children & Family Law: **SB23** was pulled from consent because of concern that the bill could force police to hold parents criminally responsible for bodily injury or death for sports and activities that are the result of normal participation for a child. This bill failed by a vote of 152-190.

Housing: **SB284** requires local municipalities to regulate parking to no more than one space per unit. This is the first of a group of bills that the sponsors have targeted as a way to alleviate the housing shortage, but have taken center stage on the principle of land use control (local vs state). The state's one size fits all, or the local municipality knows best! Land owners' constitutional rights versus overbearing local control! This bill easily passed by a vote of 197-144! But the breakdown is interesting: for 94R and 102D, and against 95R and 49D. Both Cyril and I support local control and voted against this bill. More land use bills are coming, and unfortunately, most will pass. We are already talking to Governor Ayotte, encouraging her to veto!

Cyril and I would like to call out to our two Pittsfield constituents who greeted us in front of the State House. It was clear that they did not agree with our actions on the budget (HB1/HB2), but we were able to have a pleasant and open conversation. Our parting thought was that the current House budget is a long way from the final. They were on their way to the Senate budget hearing.
