Fire Department Employees Receive Commendations

At a recent Selectboard meeting, six fire department employees were honored for their exemplary actions during a call for service. Fire Chief Peter J. Pszonowsky, Deputy Chief Robert A. Freese, Paramedic Jennifer A. Tedcastle, Lieutenant Jeremy K. Yeaton, Firefighter-AEMT Eric R. Nilsson, Firefighter Aime J. Dalbec were issued letters of meritorious service along with a life-saving medal and commendation bar.

"Your actions are a shining example of the best skills and response that the Fire Department has to offer. The call was to respond to a motor vehicle crash and to tend to two individuals who sustained multiple trauma and life-threatening injuries. From the adept actions of the responding crew to extricate, stabilize, and transport the individuals to the emergency room within 38 minutes (17 minutes on scene and 21 minutes of transport time), the individuals' medical outcomes were greatly improved by such an expeditious response."

In Memory of Gregory Wayne Terrell

July 17, 1955 - July 15, 2025

Gregory Wayne Terrell was born in Alamosa, Colorado on July 17, 1955 to Barbara Crowder Terrell and Vern Terrell. Greg was the firstborn child of the four children born to this union. Greg was joined by his younger brother, Glenn and two younger sisters, Donna and Karen.

Greg grew up in Durango, Colorado and spent a few of his high school years living in Phoenix, Arizona. Greg graduated high school from Durango High School in 1974. Greg was a member of the Durango High School ski team and was an avid skier from a young age along with his siblings. He went on to further his education at Adams State College in Alamosa, Colorado. During his time at Adams State, Greg lived with his maternal grandparents, Olivia and Howard Crowder.

During his early childhood Greg spent much time camping with his mother and siblings along with an annual camp trip that also included his Grandmother, Aunt and several cousins. Greg enjoyed camping all of his life.

Greg was an avid reader and astute learner and indeed was a “professor” of World, American and Colorado history. Greg loved the subject of history and his academic knowledge was considered as expert by the many persons that had the opportunity to listen to Greg deliver a discourse of a piece of history. Greg was an amazing story teller and would weave stories that included historical facts.

Greg had the ability to be a quick study of any trade he wanted to learn. Greg taught himself all aspects of building a home, including framing, plumbing, electrical, tile work, and excelled in finish carpentry.

Greg was also an amazing cook and baker. Greg worked as a chef on large commercial fishing boats in Alaska for several years. His pies were famous and were actually used as trade when another boat had a part or supply item that might be needed on the boat he was working on. Greg was a much sought after camp cook for many hunting expeditions in Colorado and also had his own business doing sleigh ride dinners, cooking fabulous meals on a wood stove in a large tent that was an original tent used by the 10th Mountain Division. Greg also owned and ran a deli and a restaurant in his earlier years.

Greg had many talents and was always eager to share his knowledge with anyone interested in learning. Greg lived in Leadville, Colorado when his daughter and two sons were young. He was a Boy Scout leader for his sons’ troops, taking them on many adventures into the wilderness, learning survival skills such as building a fire, a shelter, and how to tie different knots. Greg was also very involved in the design and build of the National Mining Hall of Fame and Museum in Leadville, Colorado.

Greg had a deep love of music, artists, bands and of course history of music. He collected vinyl of all types of music from 70’s rock to classical to jazz in his early years and would spend hours in small used record shops. He owned probably every Beatles album ever made, along with every album that had the music of the Beatles in another genre. He knew the names of band members and all the bands they had been a member of, along with their personal history. Greg could name albums, song titles and trivia about artists and bands from memory. He loved all types of music and it was always a treat when Greg would introduce music that was alternative, eccentric or unique.

Greg lived in Saguache, Colorado for several years. He was voted mayor of the town in 2016 after serving as interim mayor. Greg loved this unpaid position, as he cared deeply in helping his community.

He moved to Pittsfield in May 2022 and was an faithful member of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church. He loved the community and the area,. He tended his garden and when able made trips to the ocean. Greg lost his battle with cancer and passed away 113 days after his mother, Barbara, and 60 days after his father, Vern, and 2 days before his 70th birthday.

Greg’s memory will live on through the stories and lifetime memories held by his siblings Glenn, Donna and Karen. His nieces, nephews and many cousins share in the loss of Greg. He was truly a “one of a kind!”

Dr. Sandie MacDonald

Tell us a bit about your background in education.

I've dedicated my entire career to public education here in New Hampshire. Over the years, I've served as a classroom teacher, principal, curriculum director, assistant superintendent, and superintendent. I also worked as a Bureau Chief at the NH Department of Education. My experience spans school finance, policy, grants, strategic planning, and leadership development. I hold an Ed.D. in Learning, Leadership, and Community from Plymouth State University and am certified in NH as a Superintendent, Principal, Business Administrator, and both Elementary and Business Education Teacher.

Tell us about any connections you have to the Pittsfield community.

Pittsfield holds a special place in my heart. I lived in Barnstead for many years and taught at Barnstead Elementary School, where my own children also attended. I've known and worked alongside members of the Pittsfield community throughout my career, and it's a privilege to now serve as your superintendent. I value the strong sense of community here and the pride people take in their schools.

What are some things about the Pittsfield School District that you're most excited about?

What excites me most is the potential. Despite recent challenges, I see a committed staff, caring families, and a community that wants to see its schools thrive. The opportunity to rebuild trust, strengthen leadership, and focus on student success, both academic and personal, is incredibly energizing to me. I believe in Pittsfield's future.

What are some challenges that Pittsfield School District faces that you find most pressing?

The district faces some significant challenges, financial instability, staffing shortages, and difficult decisions around facilities and programming. Rebuilding morale, ensuring consistent leadership, and making sustainable, student-centered decisions will be critical. While these issues won't be solved overnight, I believe that with transparency, thoughtful planning, and strong collaboration, we can make meaningful progress.

How can you support the community and how can the community support you?

My goal is to lead with transparency, communication, and care. I want the community to feel informed, included, and heard. In return, I ask for patience, open dialogue, and a shared commitment to doing what's best for Pittsfield's students. We're truly in this together, and I welcome the community's partnership.

Dr. Erik Anderson

Tell us a bit about your background in education.

I began my career as a public educator in Illinois, where I grew up. For nearly a decade, I taught and coached at Pittsfield (Illinois) High School, before my family and I moved to northern New Hampshire, where I became an administrator. I've dedicated over two decades to school leadership in New Hampshire and Massachusetts. Over the years, I've been privileged to serve as an elementary, middle and high school Principal, as well as a Director/Principal at schools dedicated to serving students who require specialized programming. I earned a Doctor of Arts in Organizational Leadership from Franklin Pierce University and am certified as a K-12 Principal and Superintendent in New Hampshire.

Tell us about any connections you have to our community.

I have always been attracted to and by rural communities and schools. I love the pride, spirit and connectedness I've felt, and helped to instill, and am most at home when schools and the community work hand-in-hand for the growth, development and benefit of their children. I experienced that in Pittsfield, IL, a town of 4,200, and north of Franconia Notch, in New Hampshire, where I was Principal at Bethlehem Elementary and White Mountains Regional High School. Having been in suburban/urban Massachusetts for the last thirteen years, I intentionally sought out school leadership in a rural community, back in New Hampshire. I'm incredibly pleased and proud to be here in Pittsfield and look forward to helping develop deep-rooted connections between the school and community that translate to phenomenal learning opportunities for our students.

What are some things about the Pittsfield School District that you're most excited about?

I truly believe that we are small, but mighty. For kids, success in school is primarily relationships-driven. That's part of the reason why Pittsfield is genuinely a wonderful place to learn and grow. In terms of establishing strong self-awareness, a sense of purpose and spirit of belonging in our young people, nowhere else can touch us.

What are some challenges that Pittsfield School District faces that you find most pressing?

Providing a top-tier education that is responsive to student needs is our responsibility. At PMHS, we are presently working collaboratively with our building and district-wide leaders to do just that, while actively taking account of our current fiscal situation. I see an amazing community, with a ton of spirit and pride, that will rebound beyond our present challenges. I've always been, and always will be, a "the cup is half full" type of person. I genuinely believe that PMHS and the district will soon be regarded as an, if not the, innovative leader of small-school education in the state.

How can you support the community and how can the community support you?

I am both a school leader and a community leader. I take that responsibility to heart. I intend for my contributions to extend beyond the doors of PMHS to make a positive difference in the lives of our students. I want the school to partner with the community for the benefit of our students, just as much as I want the community to reciprocate that partnering spirit. My door is open. I may not always be able to say yes, but I'm ready to listen to your great ideas.

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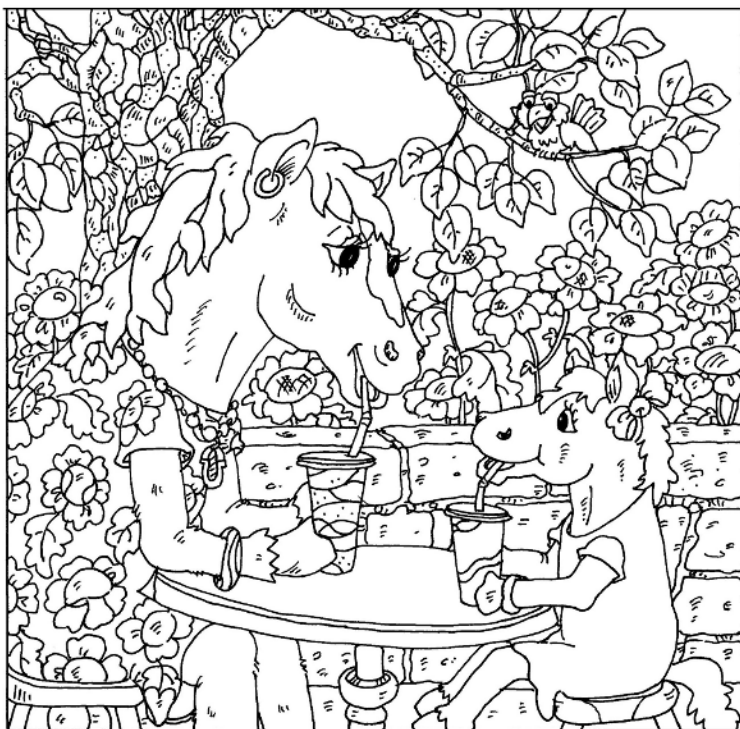


Pittsfield to Host Andru Volinsky

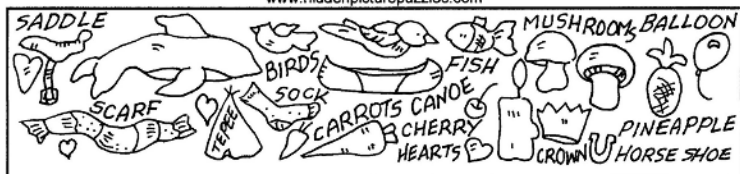
On September 9th at 6pm Andru Volinsky, author of *The Last Bake Sale: The Fight for Fair School Funding*, will speak about his recent book, which focuses on the history and current state of educational funding inequities in NH. Join us in the Pittsfield Middle High School lecture hall where he will explain the processes that led him to write his book and, importantly, he will advise attendees on what tangible steps can be taken to better our outcomes in NH schooling.

There will be time for a Q&A after Andru's reading and presentation. He will also sign books at the end of the event.

More about Andru: Andru was lead counsel to the Claremont plaintiffs for more than 20 years in Claremont School District v. Governor of New Hampshire, as they fought for fair school funding. Most recently, he served as a member of the Executive Council of New Hampshire from the 2nd district from 2017-2021. He earned his law degree from George Washington University (1980), his B.A. From the University of Miami (1976), and a certificate in conflicts resolution studies from University of Pittsburgh (1975). He has taught graduate courses in public policy and law at the University of New Hampshire and was the civic scholar in residence at Franklin Pierce University. Cooks Corner-- Pizza Dinner Salad

At the end of a long, hot day, instead of firing up the stove or the grill, why not indulge in a hearty dinner salad? This Pizza Dinner Salad recipe will check that box. Feel free to get creative here and add any of your favorite pizza toppings. I like to serve this with bread sticks, but you could also heat up some garlic bread. Mangia!! *MP Christakos*

Dressing

3 TBSP drained, oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes, finely chopped

3 TBSP finely grated Parmesan cheese

2 & ½ TBSP balsamic vinegar

½ tsp garlic powder

¼ tsp black pepper

¼ tsp red pepper flakes



Combine all dressing ingredients in a lidded jar, shake well.

In a large bowl, add all salad ingredients and toss with some of the dressing until coated. Top with fresh basil leaves and grated Parmesan cheese.
