Cooks Corner - Fish Tacos

Here's a fun and easy alternative to the 'same old, same old' dinner options. These fish tacos are delicious and healthy; and the sauce is terrific. I usually make a double batch of the sauce and serve it with cooked shrimp instead of cocktail sauce. I like to serve these tacos with Spanish rice and a side of corn. Bon appetit!

MP Christakos

| ¾ cup sour cream | ½ tsp salt |
| 1 can (4 oz) chopped green chiles | ½ tsp each: black pepper, cayenne pepper and paprika |
| 1 TBSP fresh chopped cilantro | 4 flour (or corn) tortillas, warmed |
| 1 TBSP lime juice | 1 bag cole slaw mix (save the sauce packet for another use) |
| 4 tilapia fillets | Pico de gallo |
| ½ cup flour | Additional chopped cilantro for serving |
| 1 large egg white, beaten (or 1 large egg) | Lime wedges for serving |
| ½ cup panko breadcrumbs | |
| 1 TBSP vegetable oil | |

Place sour cream, chiles, cilantro and lime juice in a mini-chop or blender, cover and process until smooth. Set aside.

Cut each tilapia fillet in half lengthwise into 2 portions. Place flour, egg white (or egg) and panko in 3 separate bowls. Dip tilapia in the flour, shaking off excess, then dip in the egg and then in the panko. In a large skillet over medium heat, heat the oil. Cook the fish, in batches if necessary, until flaky and golden brown, about 4 to 5 minutes per side. Combine the seasonings in a small bowl and sprinkle over the cooked fish.

Place a little of the cole slaw (cabbage) mix on a warmed tortilla, top with the fish, then drizzle with the sour cream mixture and a little pico de gallo. Serve with lime wedges and extra chopped cilantro, if desired. A few rings of pickled jalapeno are also great on these tacos.

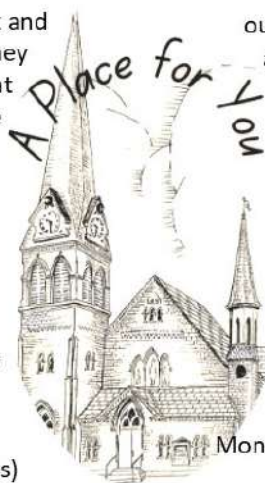

HB1123 would require certain companies to post expected salary ranges on public job listings failed,

149-193 **Voted against.**

HB1352 would extend the time insurance companies have to pay disputed claims failed 153-184. **Voted against.**

HB1452 allows the commissioner to waive the driver education course requirement for youth with parents who instruct & train them.
