Pittsfield High School Recognized for Literacy Growth

I want to take a moment to share something I'm genuinely proud of.

Pittsfield High School was recently recognized by the New Hampshire Department of Education for strong literacy outcomes based on SAT reading and writing results. This recognition is part of an effort led by Governor Ayotte and Commissioner Caitlin Davis to identify schools across the state where students are seeing real success in literacy.

In her message, Commissioner Davis noted that the work happening in schools like ours is "making a meaningful difference for students and families across New Hampshire," and that the goal is to better understand what is working so those practices can be shared more broadly.

At Pittsfield, the growth is real.

In 2021, about 43% of our students were meeting or exceeding expectations in reading and writing. This fall, that number was 71%. We also had a group of students in 2024 reach 89%, which was exceptional.

But what matters more to me than the numbers is how we got there.

This is about the work happening in classrooms every day. It's about teachers building relationships with students, holding them to high expectations, and showing up consistently.

Sarah Carson shared with me that her 11th grade students have grown from 40% to 70% meeting or exceeding. That kind of growth doesn't happen by chance. It reflects steady, intentional work with students over time.

Sarah said something that stuck with me: students do their best work when they trust you and know you care. That is exactly what we are seeing.

I want to recognize Sarah for that. The consistency, the care, and the commitment she brings to her students matter, and it shows.

We're also seeing strong outcomes beyond the SAT. Over the past three years, more than 90% of our seniors have passed the Civics Exam on the first try.

For a small district, this is important. These are the kinds of results that tell us students are reading, thinking, and engaging at a level that will serve them beyond high school.

I'm proud of our students. I'm proud of our staff.

And I'm especially proud that the work happening here, quietly, every day, is being recognized at the state level.

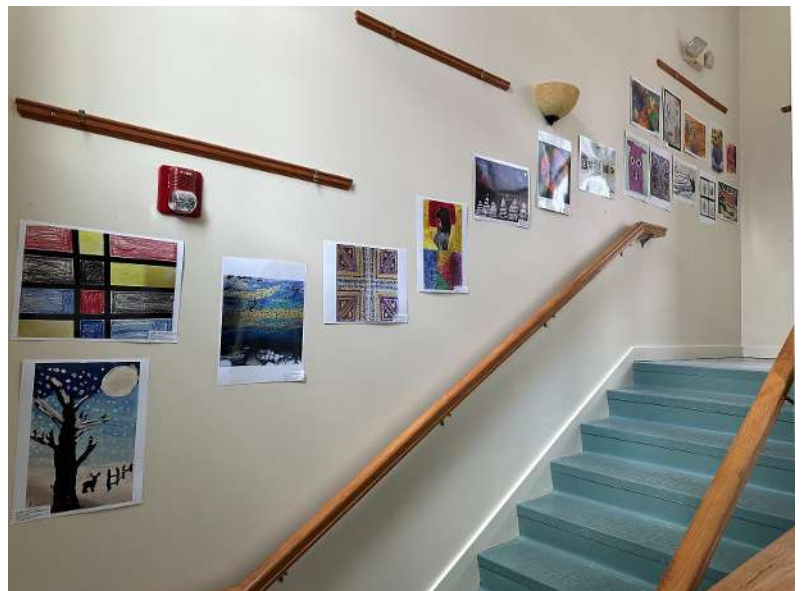
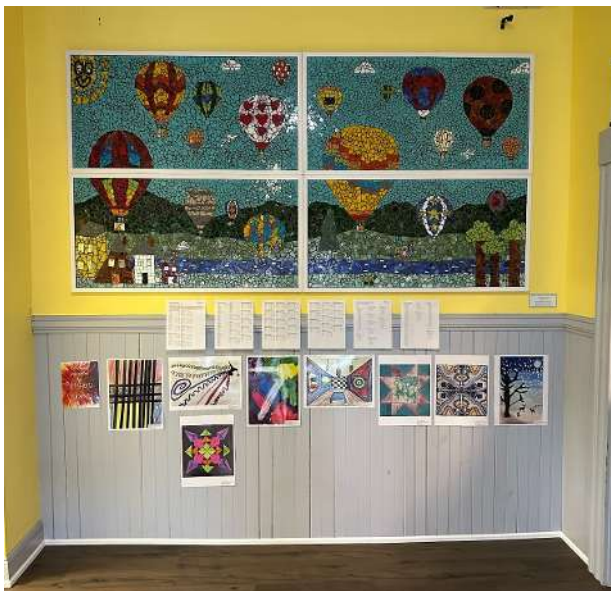

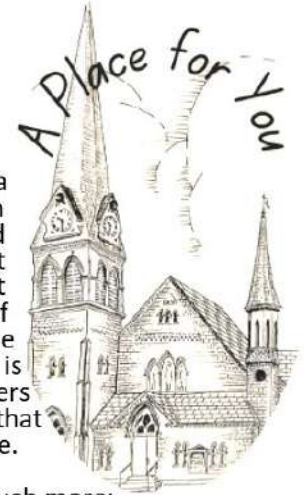

Cooks Corner Sausage – Hash Brown Breakfast Casserole

Here's a lovely breakfast casserole that would be a delicious addition to your Easter Sunday brunch buffet. Serve with warm biscuits or your favorite toasted bagels, and maybe some sliced tomatoes or a big bowl of mixed fruit. This dish is also great for dinner, served with a nice tossed salad on the side. Enjoy!

- 1 lb package ground pork sausage with sage (such as Jimmy Dean's)
- 1 lb package hot ground pork sausage
- 1 (30 oz) package frozen shredded hash browns
- 2 tsp kosher salt, divided
- 1 tsp black pepper, divided
- 1 & ½ cups sharp shredded cheddar cheese, divided
- 6 large eggs, beaten
- 1 cup whole milk
- 1 TBSP chopped fresh parsley
- 1 TBSP chopped fresh chives

Heat oven to 350. Coat a 9x13 inch baking dish with cooking spray. Cook the sausage in a large skillet until cooked through. Remove from heat; drain well on paper towel.

Working in batches, cook hash browns according to package directions, but omit salt if it's called for on the package. When hash browns are done, sprinkle with 1 tsp salt and ½ tsp pepper.

Stir together sausage, hash browns and 1 cup of the cheddar cheese in a bowl. Spoon into the prepared baking dish. Whisk together eggs, milk and remaining 1 tsp salt and ½ tsp pepper. Pour the eggs over the sausage mixture. Sprinkle the top with remaining ½ cup of the cheddar.

Bake until set, about 30 minutes. Top with the chopped parsley and chives.

Your Selectboard Organizes for the 2026-27 Session

As is custom every year following voting day, the selectboard holds a meeting to organize, assign duties to the members for the upcoming year, plan for conducting routine business, and lay out a meeting schedule. This year's inaugural meeting followed that same path.

First up, the board welcomed Dan Greene, who joined as the board's newly elected member, replacing Larry Konopka, who did not seek re-election. Dan is slated to serve a three-year term concluding in 2029.

Next, the board voted this writer to serve as chairman, and Paul Colby, as vice-chair, to serve until the next required reorganization in the spring of 2027. I will continue as the board's representative to the Community Development Committee and the Conservation Commission. Paul will remain with the Budget Committee, Capital Improvement Plan Committee, and as an alternate for the Planning Board. Selectmen Jim Adams and Art St. Laurent will act as our principal Union negotiators. Jim Adams will also represent the selectboard on the Foss Scholarship Committee and at board meetings for the BCEP Solid Waste Facility. Dan Greene will serve as the alternate to the Budget Committee, as well as the alternate representative to Pittsfield's Planning Board. In addition to Union negotiations, Art St. Laurent will remain with the Planning Board and act as the board's liaison to the Pittsfield School Board. Retaining a system begun in 2025, I will again serve as the board's point of contact for the Highway Department; Art St. Laurent, the Police Department; and Jim Adams, the Fire Department. The selectboard will continue to hold its regular meetings on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month. However, beginning immediately, we will return to the long-standing start time of 6pm. The earlier start we've utilized this past year is difficult for many working residents who may wish to attend.

There are severe challenges ahead. With the voters removing \$600,000 from the planned municipal budget, the board must now figure out what services can continue under these constraints. The levels that residents have come to expect are no longer possible, and every department is impacted. The board will be working in the coming weeks to determine the way forward. That is this board's primary mission. We will also meet weekly until we have a fiscal plan in place. *J. C. Allard, Pittsfield Selectboard*

Dispatch From Concord House Session March 11 & 12

March 12 was the legislature's deadline to act on proposed bills passed on by the committees, so as expected there were 152 bills on consent and 190 bills to debate. The House voted to limit debate to provide time to get to as many bills as possible. The week prior, the vote to extend the period did not make the 2/3 majority. Below are some of the bills, including two of ours.

HB1376 relating to a parent's ability to raise their child in a manner consistent with the child's "biological" sex and cannot be treated as evidence of abuse, neglect, or unfitness. It passed 171-143. Voted for.

HB1378 allowing parental access to a minor child's electronic medical records, except under three circumstances: when state or federal law requires consent of the minor, a protective order is in place, or the health care provider has evidence that there will be abuse or neglect. Passed 175-149. Voted for.

HB1565-FN providing penalty for false reports of suspected abuse and neglect made to DCYF maliciously or with the intent to cause harm shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Passed 181-141. Voted for.

HB1132 limiting the flags displayed in public schools and charter schools to American, State and POW/MIA. With an exception to flags used for instruction or representing the school, military or town. Passed 182-156. Voted for.

HB1268 modifying the definition and requirements to homeschool education programs shifting New Hampshire to one of the freest states for homeschooling by eliminating burdensome requirements. Passed 180-167. In New Hampshire, the parents are in charge of their children's education. Voted for.

HB1358 passed 169-163 establishing a commission to study the transitioning process of all public schools to public charter schools. Voted for.

HB1817 permitting all students the choice to access the curriculum courses and programs within the school districts in which they reside and expanding access for EFA students. Passed 179-156. Voted for.

HB1125 allowing school districts to include the candidate's party affiliation. Passed 168-156. Voted for.

HB1300, the Property Tax Protection Act, allowing voters by a 2/3 vote to adopt a local tax cap on property tax at the November general election. Passed 177-168. Voted for.

HB1735 expanding the Right to Try Act to include severe and debilitating illnesses and not just terminal ones. Passed 181-160. Voted for.

HB1313, sponsored by us, repealing the buffer zones for reproductive health care facilities. Failed to pass, 163-171.

HB1076 authorizing the legislative body of any municipality to authorize and rescind the use of electronic ballot counting devices. Passed 182-151. Voted for.

HB1224, sponsored by us, attempting to clean up the mess with the default budgets being greater than the actual for SB2 towns, passed 186-160.
