





This Starbucks-inspired lemon loaf is deliciously moist and bursting with bright lemon flavor. Topped with a simple lemon glaze, it's the perfect goodie to pair with your morning coffee or tea, or a sweet treat for dessert.

1 & ½ cups all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp baking powder

½ tsp baking soda

¼ tsp salt

3 large eggs

1 cup granulated sugar

For the glaze

1 cup powdered sugar

2/3 TBSP fresh lemon juice

½ tsp lemon zest (optional, for garnish)

½ cup sour cream or plain Greek yogurt

½ cup vegetable oil

2 TBSP unsalted butter, melted

2 TBSP lemon zest

½ cup fresh lemon juice

1 tsp vanilla extract

½ tsp lemon extract

Heat oven to 350. Grease and line a 9x5 inch loaf pan with parchment paper. In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Set aside.

In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, sugar, sour cream, oil and melted butter until smooth. Stir in the lemon zest, lemon juice, vanilla extract and lemon extract. Gradually add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients, stirring gently until just combined. Be careful not to overmix.

Pour the batter into the prepared loaf pan and smooth the top. Bake for 45 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Let cool in the pan for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

In a small bowl, whisk together the powdered sugar and lemon juice until smooth. Adjust the consistency as needed. Spread the glaze over the top of the loaf and garnish with lemon zest if desired. *MP Christakos*





War Memorial Turns 50 Dustin Park, Main Street

The War Memorial in Dustin Park is one of Pittsfield's most valued and impressive displays. The concept originated with members of the Historical Society in the early 1970s, and a petition was submitted to the voters for the allocation of funds to erect the monument. In a notable vote of support, Colonel J. Frank Drake generously offered to personally defray half of the final cost. At the 1974 Annual Town Meeting, voters agreed to appropriate \$3,807.50 as the town's share of the expenses. Unfortunately, the actual costs eventually proved to exceed the allocated amount. In a show of patriotism, philanthropy and solidarity, several groups stepped forward, providing the required additional funds. As reported in the 1975 Pittsfield Annual Report, donations came from the Pittsfield Historical Society, American Legion Peterson Cram Post 75, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4029, the Pittsfield Rotary Club, the Pittsfield Women's Club, New Hampshire Savings Bank, the Pittsfield National Bank, and Laura Berry Offutt.

On May 30, 1975, Pittsfield held the War Memorial Dedication Ceremony, offering a fine example of the collaboration between a town and its people for the good of all. Originally, the War Memorial honored only those who served in World War I and II, the Korean Conflict, and the Vietnam War. Two "wings" were added in 2006. One "wing" honors veterans from earlier wars, and one is currently blank. The site has become a favored location for Memorial Day Ceremonies.



House Session May 8, 2025

CACR8 would present a Constitutional Amendment to the voters on the next ballot, creating an age limit of 75 for the county sheriff. The bill failed to reach the 2/3 vote (241) requirement by a vote of 203-158. Cyril and I did not vote for the age restriction since the sheriff's office is elected every two years, and the voters can easily determine the fitness of the sheriff.

SB58 passed by 212-150 to move the venue in criminal prosecution of a death resulting from a controlled drug to where the death took place or where the manufacturing/sale of the substance occurred. This bill promised a better outcome for justice.

SB62, while it does not compel local law enforcement to act as ICE, it prevents municipalities from prohibiting local law enforcement from working with ICE. It passed 200-162. This bill was amended to include language to fortify the law against attempts to provide Sanctuary Cities.

SB262 increases the penalty for sex trafficking, prostitution, or exploiting children by raising the minimum prison sentence from 7 to 18 years and also increases the maximum penalty from 30 to life. This bill passed 290-71.

SB292 requires that disbursements for special education aid to a school district be at least 80% of the special aid costs in the fiscal year and passed by a voice vote.

SB295 removes the household income threshold for student eligibility for Education Freedom accounts and places a cap for 2 years on the participation number in the EFA program. The cap will be removed automatically in 2 years if the enrollment cap is not met. This bill passed 188-176.

SB251 establishes a commission to study the delivery of public health services through regional public health networks and the continued development of coordinated responses to public health incidents and emergencies in New Hampshire. This bill failed 157- 202 since this law was determined unnecessary as the Bureau of Emergency Preparedness, Response and Recovery already had the infrastructure for this work.

SB141, extending the time to petition for a new trial in certain cases was amended to add library cards and membership status to the list of confidential library user records was passed 192-170. Nothing in this bill excludes a school from notifying parents about educational materials being borrowed by or taught to their children. The laws in this bill are unrelated. The library card law was added as a non-germane law to attempt to get it passed this year!

SB105 enables taxpayers to adopt budget caps for their towns as well as provisions for a town to modify an existing budget cap by a 3/5 majority vote. Passed 193-168.

SB153 expedites a partnership between the DOT and residential developers to allow for reduced times for driveway permits and require approval or denial of any driveway for residential use of 20 units or greater to be completed within 60 days. This bill passed 293-61.
